

Museum Reopen will Feature New Interactive Lobby



As part of the CMM redesign, key characters from Chicago's maritime history come to life in the form of recorded narrated greetings to CMM patrons as they enter the lobby of the museum.

The new lobby design, proposed by Lafferty Van Heest & Associates, will offer visitors the opportunity to explore Chicago's history through imagery, film, and storytelling. Entitled From Muddy Marsh to Metropolis, Louis Jolliet, Jean Baptiste Point du Sable, Gurdon Hubbard, and Daniel Burham will greet visitors for a virtual walkthrough of Chicago's maritime history.

French fur trader Jolliet tells the story of meeting natives who reported an easier route from the Mississippi River to Lake Michigan with a short portage through a marsh called Shikaakwa (Chicago). Du Sable, whom some believed to be a former Haitian slave, tells how he established the first settlement in Chicago. Hubbard, Chicago's first mayor, speaks to the burden of wading through the marsh of the



Chicago portage to bring goods between the Mississippi and Lake Michigan. And architect Burnham enlightens visitors on his vision for Chicago where the city's magnificent lakefront would exist for all Chicagoans.


The lobby redesign represents the first stage of a museum update that will feature new exhibits focused on topics such as waterway stewardship, diversity in sailing, and underwater exploration. The Covid-19 pandemic and May 2020 flood, caused the museum to close in the spring of 2020. Museum board members, staff, and volunteers used this opportunity to reconsider presentation and use of space to offer a more engaging exploration of maritime history for CMM patrons.

After restoration to pre-storm conditions, the museum looks forward to a soft opening in June and a grand opening in late summer to introduce the redesigned lobby. A more comprehensive redesign, including new exhibits, is planned for 2022.

Board Member Captain Dave Truitt Donates Charlotte Ann Model to CMM



The model ship Charlotte Ann, donated by CMM board member Captain Dave Truitt, was accessioned into the museum's collection this month.


The restored 87-foot Charlotte Ann built in1888, treated tourists to luxurious days on Lake Michigan. The ship's original function was to dredged oysters out of Delaware Bay and later, during Prohibition, she served as a midnight rum runner.

The boat's working life almost ended when it was discovered partially submerged and burned to the waterline in the Hudson River by an entrepreneur, John Woodside, who rebuilt the craft for use as a charter vessel in the Caribbean in 1971.

Windward Yacht Charters brought her to Chicago in 1984, where she sailed as a charter ship for several years. Captain Truitt purchased the boat shortly after, rebuilt her, and continued to entertain people on evening cruises along the lakefront.

The museum's model shipbuilder, Glenn Braun, is fine-tuning the Charlotte Ann model for a future exhibit.
